





Dear Members of the Veterinary Medical Association of New York City,

The Board Members would like to extend their sincere gratitude to those members who took the time to respond to the VMA NYC Member survey. We were delighted with the number of replies and the thoughtful suggestions and criticisms. We will use the feedback to help identify ways to continue to shape this organization to best serve our veterinary community.

There was a total of 69 responses. Of those who completed the survey, the years of membership of respondents were evenly distributed with 33% that have been members for 0-5 years, 38% for 6-20 years and 29% for 20 years or more. Membership is driven primarily by access to the continuing education lectures and the desire to be part of a professional organization. Most rated the CE lectures as either excellent (45%) or good (38%), and there was a long list of suggested topics for future lectures that will be used by the program committee. We anticipate participation in the monthly CE meetings will increase now that the veterinary profession is required to receive continuing education to maintain a veterinary license in New York State.


Almost all of the respondents receive the newsletter (91%), but we will look into the few folks who responded "No" to determine why. Most prefer to get the newsletter electronically (64%), and the quality of the newsletter was rated as Good (46%) or Excellent (20%) by most respondents. There were several constructive suggestions for improvements, including getting more input from the members.


While the VMA of NYC organizes several social outings each year, 76% reported they did not attend an event. The main reason cited was lack of interest (63%), followed by calendar conflicts (44%). There were some very thoughtful and exciting suggestions for other types of social events including; a charity event, a Broadway show, an all day CE events, volunteering opportunities and a picnic.

Most respondents had never attended a NYC VMA dinner dance (39%). The two main reasons cited for limited attendance included the expense (41%) and a calendar conflict (41%). Another 27% cited some other reason which was often just a lack of interest. Several members offered input on whether there should be changes made to the dinner dance. While 26% feel it is fine the way it is, 21% felt there should be a way to make it less costly.


Several members (31%) would like to become more active in the NYC VMA, and almost as many (29%) would like to at some future time. While time is a valuable commodity for us all, we encourage you to find ways to become more involved to have a stronger collective voice and to help implement many of the suggestions that were offered for better serving the membership!








Other: responses included things such as networking, staying abreast of veterinary medicine, and the value of participating in an organized group that can influence and support our profession.





Q3. How many CE meetings do you attend each year on average?


Q5. If you think the quality of the content of the meetings could be improved, please comment:

The vast majority of the responses were requests to change the venue, day of the week and time of the meetings. There were positive comments regarding the quality of the speakers and the lecture notes. There were also a few requests for specific lectures and to conduct round table discussions.


Q6. What topics or speakers would you like to hear at the meetings? There were several great suggestions for CE topics which have been shared with the program committee. Thanks for the suggestions.




Q8. Do you receive the NYC VMA newsletter? Almost everyone responded yes.










Other: Of the 9 responses, 44% don't have enough time. Other responses included; too costly, don't know anyone else, and prefer to spend my free time with family and friends.

Q14. What other types of social outing would you like the NYC VMA to organize? There were some very thoughtful and exciting suggestions including; charity events, baseball, Broadway show, Zoo visit, all day CE events, volunteering, picnic, more happy hours, nothing.








Other: Of the 10 responses most implied that they were not interested. The specific reasons cited included; unappealing for most NYC veterinarians; don't know other attendees; money better spent if tied to fund raising; don't enjoy large gatherings, too far to travel.

Q17. Are there any other changes would you like to make to the dinner dance? Of 19 responses, 26% reiterated there should be no changes and 21% think it is too expensive. Some of the specific suggested changes included; a three hour cocktail party without a sit down dinner to offer more ongoing conversation; focus more on the food and beverage rather than the venue; preference for a DJ over a band; allow members to vote on awards; awards presentation not engaging and difficult to hear and see; arrange for a post dinner dance after party for those who are interested or who may not be able to attend the actual dinner; make it a family friendly event; make it a NYSAVE fundraiser; cancel; make it more hip.

Q18. What other comments or suggestions would you like to share to help the NYC VMA improve what it offers for its members? Of the 10 responses, some of the specific suggestions included become more politically active and develop a business sense; allow members to bring more than one guest to CE lectures; engage non-traditional veterinarians and new graduates; institute term limits for board members; open awards voting to all members; eliminate the listserv; organize a wet lab; get VMA more involved in animal related events to promote us and our profession; hold meetings in other boroughs; stronger leadership and better vision for the future.



Q20. If you answered N, Maybe or Not right now to Q 19, what would it take to get you more involved with the VMA? Of the 23 responses, 35% do not have enough time, 13% have conflicts and 17% desire a friendlier environment. Specific answers included; offering philanthropic activities; a more diverse membership.
